What should I look for in this exhibition?

Magical Creatures

Look at the *Chrysanthemum Festival Badge* (cat no 45). This dragon looks pretty mad. What makes him look that way? Where does he live? Look closely at the patterns and colours. They are telling us about how he feels and where he comes from.

This image is much smaller than you think. It is a Festival of flowers badge that is worn on special occasions Can you see the chrysanthemum flowers in the background? This image is a silk embroidery which means that it has been hand stitched with very fine thread. The festival badge was made over 350 years ago!

The ancient Chinese believed that dragons lived in every river, lake and sea and also lived high in the sky among the rain clouds. Make a design for a festival badge of a ferocious dragon sitting on top of a rain cloud looking down on the Earth..

After viewing the *Celestial Silks* exhibition, Mary wants to have a female vest similar to the Noblewoman's ceremonial vest (cat no 35) for her Year 10 Formal. Can you help her to design one?

Activity 3 -Part A

Read the following legend about the Eight Immortals plan to celebrate the God of Longevity's birthday.

Eight Immortals Celebrate God of Longevity's Birthday (八仙庆寿)

After each showing his or her special prowess to cross the sea, Eight Immortals (八仙) were the happiest immortals that ever lived. They lived in their paradise Mount Kunlun (昆仑山). They were good friends. They never felt lonely.

One day, a crane flew to their garden and brought a letter to them. It was from the God of Longevity (Nanji Xianweng 南极仙翁) inviting them to his birthday party.

'How old is Xianweng?'asked Lu Dongbin (吕洞宾), dressed like a scholar with his sword on his back.

'Maybe five hundred years old,' said Cao Guojiu(曹国舅). 'Look at his forehead. It becomes higher and higher. It notes for his longevity.'

'What should we bring to Xianweng for his birthday present?' asked Zhang Guolao (张 果老), sitting backward on his donkey.

'Of course, a bottle of good wine' called Tieguai Li (铁拐李) from the table, holding a big bottle gourd. 'I have just made some good wine. Guolao, smell it.'

'Xianweng doesn't like wine the way you do Tieguai Li,' said He Xiangu (何仙姑) waving her lotus softly. 'Why don't we play some music?'

'What should I do?' called Tieguai Li. 'I don't know how to play any musical instrument. Look at my leg. I can't...'



Activity 3 - Part B


